

WE SHALL REMAIN: America Through Native Eyes Episode 2: Tecumseh's Vision (82 minutes)

Tecumseh's Vision, is a PBS documentary that follows the years after the American Revolution. This episode tells the story of the Shawnee leader Tecumseh (March 1768 – October 5, 1813) and his brother, Tenskwatawa, (1775 – November 1836) known as the Prophet who led a spiritual revival movement drawing thousand of followers from tribes across the Midwest.

Tecumseh forged a pan-Indian political and military alliance from that movement, coming closer than anyone since to creating an independent Indian State. He believed that no tribe had the right to sell property even to each other, let alone to strangers (the white men). He struggled to unite all Native people to save their land from foreign encroachment.
